

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
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MY ENTIRE HIGH SCHOOL SINKING INTO THE SEA THURSDAY, MAY 4 - 7:00PM

From acclaimed graphic novelist Dash Shaw (*New School*) comes an audacious debut that is equal parts disaster cinema, high school comedy and blockbuster satire, told through a dreamlike mixed media animation style that incorporates drawings, paintings and collage. Dash (Jason Schwartzman) and his best friend Assaf (Reggie Watts) are preparing for another year at Tides High School muckraking on behalf of their widely-distributed but little-read school newspaper, edited by their friend Verti (Maya Rudolph). But just when a blossoming relationship between Assaf and Verti threatens to destroy the boys' friendship, Dash learns of the administration's cover-up that puts all the students in danger. As disaster erupts and the friends race to escape through the roof of the school, they are joined by a popular know-it-all (Lena Dunham) and a lunch lady (Susan Sarandon) who is much more than meets the eye. But even as the film piles on brilliant details like a post-apocalyptic cult formed by jocks, video game homages, and an infectious synth soundtrack, it never loses sight of the characters at the heart of the story.

Hailed as "the most original animated film of the year" and "John Hughes for the Adult Swim generation" (*Indiewire*), the film's everyday concerns of friendships, cliques and young love remind us how the high school experience continues to shape who we become, even in the most unusual of circumstances



Following that, he produced The First Twenty Million is The Hardest, Because of Winn-Dixie and the independent film Waiting For Forever. His most recent production is the Academy Award nominated documentary, Glen Campbell: I'll Be Me. Albert is currently Chair of the Harold Ramis Film School at Second City and a consulting producer at 20th Century Fox Animation. Trevor is a distinguished member of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.



James Choi

James Choi is a prolific, award-winning filmmaker with over a decade of film industry experience in Los Angeles having worked in representation, production and digital media. His first feature film as a producer, *Made in China*, won the Grand Jury Prize for Best Feature Film at SXSW in 2009 and is distributed by IFC Films. Since then, Choi has produced four feature films that have screen widely on the festival circuit. *Empty Space* marks his second feature film as a director and his second collaboration with Judi Krant, the writer/director of *Made In China*. It is currently playing at festivals around the world and was picked up for theatrical distribution in South Korea. Choi is based out of Chicago and teaches film at DePaul University's School of Cinematic Arts.



Beckie Stocchetti

Beckie Stocchetti oversees all Independent and Local Film Initiatives at the Chicago Film Office, City of Chicago Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events. Prior to joining DCASE, she was the Director of Engagement and Programs at documentary production company Kartemquin Films. Also in Chicago, Stocchetti worked as the Program Director at Chicago Filmmakers. From 2009 – 2011 Stocchetti served as the Assistant Film Curator and Business Manager of the Doris Duke Theater at the Honolulu Academy of Arts. Additionally, she has worked with the Hawaii International Film Festival in various capacities including Development consultant, Director of Education, and Projection Manager. Stocchetti co-curates Run of Life, a monthly experimental documentary series through the Nightingale Cinema in Chicago. Stocchetti has a degree from the University of Chicago in Cinema and Media Studies.



John Otterbacher

After graduating with a Master of Science in Communications from Grand Valley State University in Michigan, John Otterbacher moved to Chicago where he splits his time between teaching and filmmaking. Otterbacher has worked as a producer and cinematographer specializing in independent film/ tv/new media and work for non-profit organizations. As a college instructor, Otterbacher has taught at a number of institutions and is currently coordinator for the Cinematography program at Tribeca Flashpoint College in Chicago. He is a board member of IFP Chicago and a member of the Education Advisory Committee of Cinema/Chicago. In 2016, Otterbacher received his MFA in film from VCFA as part of the inaugural class with the short version of his documentary Officially Limited. Current projects include Father Burke's Boss Battle, a short film about a priest addicted to video games and Moving Parts, a narrative feature, now in post-production.

<u>How we educate</u>

At Cinema/Chicago, we recognize that film is a powerful tool. Established in 1992, our year-round Education Program brings film to Chicago students, showcases the creativity of young filmmakers and facilitates the development of young film audiences.

EDUCATION SCREENINGS

Cinema/Chicago brings over 7,000 Chicago Public School students (grades 6-12) into theaters throughout the school year and during the Chicago International Film Festival for free Education Screenings.

Study guides are provided to give background on the cultural context of the films, highlight themes and historical references and introduce questions that encourage personal examination of the films' subject matter. Each screening is followed by a Q&A with filmmakers, film subjects and/or film professionals and professors.

The goals of the program are to give students from across the city the opportunity to engage with unique films and in the process, transform them from passive audience members to active viewers and thinkers. As Chicago Public Schools have limited resources to provide students with arts education experiences, this program provides buses, theaters, films, speakers, study guides and teacher support entirely free.

CINEYOUTH

Our free CineYouth Festival showcases the work of student filmmakers 22 years old and younger, highlighting the creativity of the next generation of directors, writers and performers. CineYouth features screenings of over 70 officially selected films and offers educational panels and hands-on workshops for participating guests.

Award-winning CineYouth films are shown during the Chicago International Film Festival and winning filmmakers receive cash prizes and an award recognizing their achievement.

Through CineYouth, we are proud to support young artists by honoring their work and by providing them with tools and resources to assist them in their future artistic endeavors.

CineYouth celebrates its 14th year in May 2018. The 2018 CineYouth Festival will be open for entries November 1, 2017 – March 16, 2018.

STUDENT FILM COUNCIL

Our Student Film Council provides a free program for public, private and suburban high school students who have a passion for film. Council members are given the opportunity to experience and attend the numerous film festivals and programs that take place throughout the school year in Chicago.

Members engage in conversations with directors and festival programmers with the goal of further analyzing, understanding and appreciating film and its relationship to audiences and the city.

THE BIG PICTURE SHOW.

Cinema/Chicago is a year-round, not-forprofit organization dedicated to fostering cross-cultural communication through the art of film and the moving image. We present the annual Chicago International Film Festival (October), a celebration of the best in cinema from around the world, as well as exciting education and community programs that engage, entertain, and enlighten Chicagoans of all backgrounds and ages. Our yearround programs also include the Chicago International Television Awards (March), International Screenings at the Chicago Cultural Center (May through October), CineYouth Festival (May), year-round Education Outreach Program and Members' Film Series.

FOCUS ON EDUCATION.

Our year-round Education Screenings Program introduces CPS students to cinema, integrating films into classroom curriculum while exposing students to diverse cultures, viewpoints, and subject matter. Each year we bring 8,000 students into theaters free of charge to see films and engage in discussions with filmmakers and film subjects.

The free CineYouth Festival showcases filmmakers 22 years old and younger. We present officially selected films from around the world and host hands-on workshops and development opportunities for young filmmakers. Winning films are screened at the Chicago International Film Festival

Our Student Film Council is made up of high school students from Chicagoland's public and private school systems. Throughout the school year, the Council attends numerous Chicago film festivals and engage in conversations with directors, producers and festival programmers, exploring cinema and its relationship with audiences.

SUMMER SHOWCASE.

Created in 2003, the International Screenings Program is a free weekly film series running from May through September that showcases films from around the world. Presented in partnership with the City of Chicago and various consulates and cultural organizations, the program has become one of the most popular public programs in Chicago, bringing together film and cultural enthusiasts from all walks of life.

Now in its fifth decade, the Chicago International Film Festival is North America's longest-running competitive film festival. Showcasing the latest from cinema's grand masters and introducing the work of its newest visionaries, the Festival presents films representing more than 50 countries and celebrates the vibrancy and diversity of the human experience. Festival-goers enjoy the amazing opportunity to meet film artists from around the world such as Laurie Anderson, Danny Boyle, Guillermo Del Toro, Pablo Larraín, Michael Moore, Barry Jenkins and Geraldine Chaplin as well as attend tributes to international luminaries

such as Clint Eastwood, Ron Howard, Sidney Poitier, Steven Spielberg, and Uma Thurman.

pays tribute to notable African American
artists such as Spike Lee, Viola Davis,

Berry and Charles Burnett. With films from

and Argentina, Cinema of the Americas
spotlights the fresh and vibrant work of
emerging and veteran filmmakers from
South and Central America, Mexico, and

the Caribbean. The Festival also presents OUT-Look, celebrating LGBTQ-themed films exhibiting new artistic perspectives on sexuality and identity.




